The Coalition for Allied Health Leadership is pleased to announce two leadership conferences in 2003 designed to train leaders in the areas of practice, education and research. The conferences are supported by a cooperative grant issued by the Bureau of Health Professions, U.S. Department of Health and Human Services.

Applications to participate in the leadership conferences will be accepted from individuals who are members of the associations that support the Association of Schools of Allied Health

Professions (ASAHP), the Health Professions Network (HPN) and the National Network of Health Career Programs in Two-Year Colleges (NN2).

Those selected to participate in the leadership program will be required to attend two week-long conferences in Washington, D.C., with the first taking place from **April 30-May 3** and the second scheduled for **Sept. 9-13**.

Participants also will be expected to complete a workgroup project between the conferences.

During the conferences, participants will define the qualities of leadership, learn problem-solving and decision-making skills and discuss the attributes necessary to lead in a time of

transition. Participants also will discuss regulatory and legislative issues facing the allied health professions and learn how to work with governmental agencies and elected representatives to advance allied health practice, education and research.

Inside, you'll find application forms and details describing how members of your association may apply for the program. Also enclosed is a sample press release your organization can use to announce the leadership program to your members.

During both conferences, mentors from associations and federal agencies will be assigned to facilitate the participants' successful completion of all aspects of the program.

Application Deadlines

The Participant Application Form and the Association Support Form must be received by **Feb. 1, 2003**. The Employer Support Form is optional. (Please note that in the sample press release, a Jan. 15 deadline is given for the participant application form. This allows 15 days for your association to submit all the required forms, which must be received by the Feb. 1 deadline.)

Association Costs

The supporting association is responsible for each participant's transportation, food and housing costs. We estimate that food and housing will cost approximately \$1,300 per conference for each attendee. In addition, the supporting association or the participant's employer is responsible for other costs associated with the conference such as telephone calls, faxes and postage.

Participant Selection

Fifteen individuals from the Health Professions Network's federation of allied health professional associations will be selected to team with ASAHP and NN2 participants. Selection criteria include:

- Professional practice (minimum of four years' experience required).
- Interdisciplinary experience.
- Professional association participation.
- Education.
- Community involvement.
- Communication skills.

Individuals selected for participation will be notified by March 1, 2003. Each participating association may submit multiple applications. However, to enhance the interdisciplinary nature of the conference, every effort will be made to ensure that the individuals selected to participate represent a diverse group of allied health professions.

Fifteen allied health professionals will team with educators from two- and four-year schools for the leadership program. Participants will be required to participate in two conferences in Washington, D.C., scheduled for April 30-May 3 and Sept. 9-13. They also will be required to complete workgroup projects, make group presentations and report back to their sponsoring associations.
